The Street Angels started out with 12 mem-bers five years ago and now the group boasts 26 members.

volunteers are out in the town centre every Friday night but, with more volunteers, they are hoping to provide the service on Saturday nights each week too.

Group co-coordinator PCSO David Bullock has een with Thames Valley Police for nine years and set up the group after seeing a demand in Windsor.

On a 'bitterly cold' February night in 2012, the group took to the streets for the first time. That night, they dis-

covered a man sleeping in a phone box by Windsor and Eton Central Station; he had lost his wallet and jacket and was freezing

"Obviously he could fall victim to the elements or if someone wanted to take advantage of his situation," said PCSO Bullock.

He was looked after by the Angels, who made sure he was able to get a train home.

This first night set the tone for the next five years and the Street Angels play an important part in Windsor's nighttime scene.

As well as being a Street Angel, he is a community responder and a Thames Valley Police cadet leader.

"Every night is different," he said. "We have had a couple of times where we have called an ambulance for a serious head injuries and I dread to think what would have happened if we were not there."
